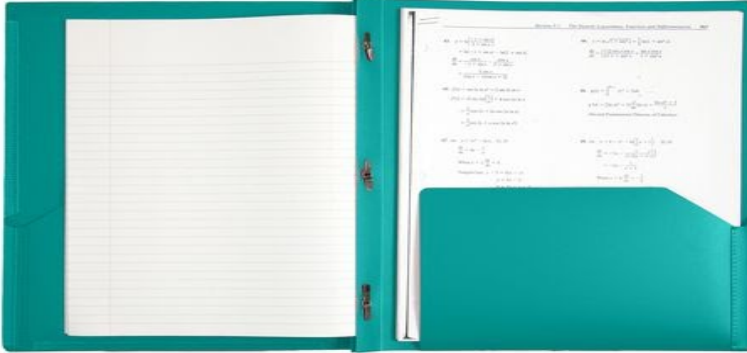

1 page essay, cover page for the magazine (not a computer image, make a drawing of them or maybe their contribution to history) and a 1-2 minute presentation.
